

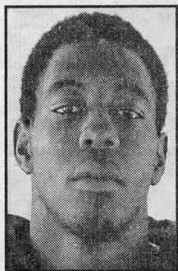
Lying in wait: Logan will help

The Marauders may already have what they were missing this season.

The Antelope Valley College men's basketball team was often out-matched on the wings in a season that ended Saturday, but Jason Logan — who joined the team in December and will be a freshman next season — is the possible solution to those problems.

“He is a human highlight film athletically,” coach Dieter Horton said. “Time will tell how good a ballplayer he is, but he is athletic as there is.”

Logan came to AVC with Byrnes (Duncan, S.C.) High School teammate Chris Whitney to join the Marauders football team as a wide receiver. While Whitney stayed on and played middle linebacker, Logan decided he no longer wanted to play football and soon Horton brought him onto his practice squad.

The 6-foot-3, 180-pound guard impressed the current Marauders in practice.

“He is an athletic monster, I'm pretty excited to see what he has and what he brings to the team (next year),” freshman point guard Rod Singleton said. “It seems like he's an energizer battery, he's not running out.”

A two-sport star at Byrnes, Logan was invited to the Carolinas All-Star Classic as a member of the South Carolina senior All-Star team. He caught 21 passes for 443 yards and seven touchdowns the same year on the football field while helping his team to a state title.

Horton has always desired exceptional athletes at the wing, players who excelled in his system his first two years at AVC — most notably Adé Dagunduro and Robert Arnold.

“We get athletes and get them to play incredibly hard and make a few plays, that is our deal,” Horton said. “Athletically he is what we didn't have this year at the guard spot.”
